The only prerequisites required for Level 1 are: participants must be at least 15 years of age and willing to provide a police check for the final certification.

We have had a couple of really great volunteers with us the last couple years who were too young to certify, but have been so valuable to our program. We have had many days where it would have been nearly impossible to run without them. Thank you so much Faith and Claira.

MENTORSHIP

In the context of the Mountain Safety Department, we have a mentorship program within our patrol that helps create a network of support. Amanda Goodhue, one of the two Mountain Safety managers at the hill, believes mentorship "is important because it creates an atmosphere where people are comfortable learning new things and asking questions". Hopefully, with these types of relationships being facilitated we will have a stronger continuity of knowledge within the department.

Building off this concept, we are moving into our second season of the Homegrown Patrol program. This is a program between the Castle Mountain Patrol and the Livingstone Ski School Academy (LSA) to create a mentorship pairing between students and newer patrollers. The intention of this is to create opportunities for

new patrollers to learn how to mentor and teach while providing knowledge and skills to kids in the community who have an interest in the avalanche industry. We are looking forward to continuing the Homegrown Patrol program for another exciting season!

STOP LEARNING BLIND!!!

Humans are experience-based creatures that feel movement in a 3D space via our senses. In short, to learn something in the physical realm, regardless of being observational, cognitive or experiential in our learning style, a feeling needs to be created and stored in our memory for later repetition.

Until now our only method to identify what is right and what works with regards to our skiing is our own feelings or the opinions of others on what we should do to improve.

When driving a car, a dashboard tells us what the car is doing and how it is performing on many different levels. Imagine driving through a zone with many speed changes. Without looking at your dash could you successfully do that? Currently your skiing is much like that; driving through the experience without a dashboard.

What if I told you there was a better way - a way to see exactly what you need to do while you are doing it - not after and not from the opinion of someone else, but a definite gauge of what to do and how to do it?

In 2019 CMR snow school began testing the CARV biometric system as an instructional tool. Last season we ran several test situations from instructor training to a camp with members of the public. The results and the testimonials were pretty incredible.

CARV is a biometric sensing system that is installed under the foot in the ski boot. It can sense

the amount your foot tips, tilts, and turns. It can also measure applied and static pressure in any part of the foot, along with speed, path and a multitude of other interactions you can have with your physical world while skiing. It is essentially a dashboard for your skiing that can provide audio cues, quantity cues and experiential cues that can help you improve turn to turn. When used properly with the help of a trained CARV instructor, CARV can take your skiing to the next level.

CMR snow school is the first snow school in Canada to use cutting edge technology like CARV in an instructional setting and we have partnered with CARV to develop an incredible instructional product. One of the hardest things when working with clients is getting them to understand that something needs to change, especially when they feel they are doing what you are asking but from your vantage point they aren't. With CARV it is very clear and they have something tangible that they can use to create new feelings.

CARV has taken staff from our snow school to Europe to work with them in further developing the product and to shoot some cool videos, with more videos likely to be shot at CMR this season.

The snow school has developed two products for use this year. One is a private lesson where you can try CARV out in a one on one setting with a CARV certified pro. We also have two 3 day camps: January 16-18 and March 14-16. The camps offer an opportunity for you to have your own system installed for you to keep.

CARV can improve on or off piste skiing as well as performance in gates, moguls and any other aspect of skiing when used with a trained CARV Pro.

MOUNTAIN MOMENTS OF THE PAST

The following excerpts are from Kenworthy S (2014). The History of West Castle to Castle Mountain Resort 1965-2007 Pg 26 Castle Mountain Community Association

By today's standards, patrolling the mountain was a haphazard affair in the opening few years at West Castle.

"Gravenstafel made good skiers out of people in a hurry, but it was challenging to get people off the mountain if they were hurt," said Charlie Russell (past manager & patroller) "and there was no grooming. You could run into a stump buried in powder and cause some really bad wounds."

Modifications had to be made to the rescue toboggans to make them suitable for the steep terrain because (Paul) Klaas's original plan of having an extra patroller with a rope controlling the back of each toboggan wasn't working according to Russell. "I think I designed something pretty good, because I knew the bloody hill was steep. It had huge chains on the front to control the speed. Paul's first one didn't really work. It was too flimsy when you put weight on it."

Along with using heavy chains to

create more drag, other modifications, such as deeper fins to dig into the snow while traversing across steep slopes and bending the handles to give better control, were also made over the first few years to make the rescue toboggans more suitable for West Castle's particular terrain.

Avalanche control in the first couple years was mostly done by "chopping it off with our skis and a bit of dynamiting," recalled Russell, "but there wasn't anyone that had training for avalanche control."





UPDATE FROM THE MD OF PINCHER CREEK

The avalanche sign along Highway 774 has been relocated to the proper location. This has allowed the park to plow the Syncline Barnaby Parking area. Hopefully this continues and eliminates parked vehicles on the highway.

Construction in Beaver Mines on the water/sewer project has taken longer than planned and there may be some delays for ski hill traffic when work is occurring along Highway 774. Construction continues but is dependent on weather conditions.

The Pincher Creek Emergency Services Commission is working on the next step in a grant application to update the Wildfire Mitigation Strategy (plan). This Strategy is for the whole municipality including Castle Mountain Community and Resort. The plan addresses key issues and supports the application for additional grants to proceed with future FireSmart work. The previous plan also identified key issues and, supported by funding, work was completed.

The MD budget for 2023 has been approved.

















CMCA Annual Membership Form – 2022/23
